




*A violence-free childhood is everyone's right!*



Welcome back from the workshop. I hope you learned good things there.






In fact we learned a lot.

What do you mean?




Yes, a good school has...

We learned that many schools say they want to be a good school but not many know how to create a good school.

Tell me more.



If we want to create a good school... we have to pay attention to our school's culture!

What... you mean drums and dancing?



No...yes... but not like you think.



Culture is about what we believe in, how we behave and what we think is important.



Yes, and a school has a culture that affects everyone. It affects what we think of each other and how we treat each other.



But culture is our traditions.. it is just there...we can't change it!?! Can we?



It was there when I was born and will be there when I die!




No, our school's culture is what we say it is. We create it. We choose what we believe and how we behave towards each other.





Yes, creating a good school is about creating a school culture that helps everybody feel good about belonging to this school.

It is about us taking responsibility for what we believe, what we think is important and how we apply those ideas in the way we relate with each other.



We can create a good school by creating a culture that respects everyone at that school.

Since culture is created by everyone... So, how should everyone create a good school culture?





By creating good relationships between everyone at school...

Relationship of teachers to students



Relationship of students with each other and with the school



Relationship of teachers with each other and the school.



...and don't forget relationships of parents and community leaders to the school!



*Yes! Even the parents and community members contribute to the creation of a good school culture.*



# Factors that influence the school culture




# 1. Relationships that *teachers* create with *students*




One who is feared.



One who is not afraid to use the cane to keep the children well behaved.



One who has quiet classrooms and writes good notes on the blackboard.



One who doesn't allow children to distract him with questions.




Our teachers used to be like that too until they realized that it doesn't have to be like that.



*Fear may make children obey but does not help them learn.*

Our teachers are friendly and approachable. They never use the stick.

They care about us.... and show that they care!



Yes, they are teachers of today... not yesterday. They realize that fear cannot help students learn.


They believe in positive discipline.






Teachers who create a good relationship with their students show following things:

They show that they respect students.




They show that they trust students to do the right thing.

They act as role models and lead by example. They behave the way they expect their students to behave.




They are friendly.... but that doesn't mean they fail to guide students.


They set clear expectations and rules and then expect students to follow them. They let students know that there are consequences for their actions.




They build positive discipline in students and show students what it's like to have a trusting relationship with teachers.

## 2. Relationship of students with each other and with the school


*Students don't get any guidance on how to behave towards each other.*



Our normal experience of a school is:

Students are not encouraged to support each other.





Students are not encouraged to help each other.

Students have no role to play in creating what kind of school they are in.



Older students can bully younger ones.



Students are not involved in creating discipline at their school.

Make sure you obey these!



Students do not get any guidelines or written rules on how the school expects them to uphold the school's values and standards.



At our school students have an important role to play in creating a good school.

Yes, how we treat our fellow students shows what we think of our school culture.



In our school, we do not tolerate anyone bullying someone else. We all speak up when we see someone being bullied.




We create opportunities for older students to be role models for younger students.



We talk about clear ways in which students who are being bullied can raise their concerns.

Students also play a role in creating discipline at our school by running the student's court.



Prefects and class monitors also help create a friendly environment for all students.

*Bullying is when someone repeatedly teases or victimizes someone less powerful.*






Even the school does many things to help students feel safe with other students:

Involve students in the formation of clear rules and guidelines on what is acceptable behavior.



Opportunities for children to seek help if they need it.

Opportunities for students to participate in the decision making at school.



Older students being encouraged to mentor and protect younger students.

Students behave towards each other the way their school behaves towards them.

A good school entails good relationships with your peers!







### 3. Relationship of teachers with each other and the school

What is true of students is also true of teachers! How we treat our fellow teachers shows how we feel about our school culture.


Teachers who help each other grow... help the school grow.



Teachers who show by example how a good teacher behaves help their fellow teachers learn and try out new ideas.

They are not afraid to speak up when they see that something is not right at their school.

The school that creates opportunities for teachers to contribute their ideas and show leadership is a good school!




Teachers who bring new ideas to their staff room, who speak to fellow teachers about how they can all work together to create a better school...they are our heroes!





A good school promotes good relationships between teachers....



...and between teachers and the school!



*Help teachers feel that they belong to the school and the school belongs to them!*

# 4 Relationships of parents and community leaders to school!



A school is not an island. It lives in the community and is accountable to the parents and other community members.

... and yet when the school reaches out to parents, parents may think...

They are demanding school fees

My child has done something wrong

They want something from me.



It doesn't have to be like that. We can reach out to parents with a view to involving them more in the school.



A good school invites parents to celebrate their school.





Yes, it sends information home with students to help parents remain aware of what is going on at school and how they can contribute their ideas.


It asks students to talk to their parents about what a good school is and how their school is trying to become one.





The school does many things to help parents and community members feel that their involvement at school is welcome:

You can call a parents' meeting once a term or once a year.






During visitation days, put up special exhibitions that inform parents of key things that are going on at school.

Send home written notes that invite comments or involvement.



Hold a school pride day where everyone contributes their labor or ideas on how to make the school a better place.

**GOOD SCHOOL**




# Step 1.

Put together a team that can help the school lead this process. Invite teachers, students and parents to join this team.



## Step 2.

Prepare for change! Find out what others at your school think about these ideas. Hold a big meeting and invite parents and other community members. Make a public commitment to create a good school.



# Step 3.

Learn about what makes a good teacher and how teachers can help students to feel good about their school.



# Step 4.

Learn about positive discipline and how the culture at school can help everyone feel safe.




## Step 5.

Learn about how a good school creates a good learning environment. This means thinking about physical and psychological environment of the school. Do students and teachers feel safe? Do parents feel welcome?



## Step 6.

How can the administration help sustain the hard work everyone has put in to create a good school? What guidance can they give? What written guidelines and policies can they introduce so that everyone feels that their school belongs to them?
